#### PLAY PUMPS: A NEW INVENTION TURNS WORK INTO PLAY

- 1 For kids in many rural parts of Africa, the colorful Play Pump is the first playground equipment they have ever seen. The Play Pump Water System uses the energy of children at play to operate a water pump. This **incredible** invention changes the children's play time and their lives.
- 2 In rural Africa, clean water is a luxury. Most people don't have running water in their homes. They often walk long distances to wells and carry heavy containers of water back.
- Patricia Molope, 17, explains that before her South African village got a Play Pump, people paid a taxi driver to take them to a far-away well. 'Sometimes the taxi drivers were busy, and we couldn't have a bath for a long time. We wanted to save our water to do other things. It was too far to walk **there**, but now we have our own clean water in our village, and life is much better.'
- 4 The chore of carrying water traditionally is the responsibility of women and girls. Carrying water for miles and hours each day is a very big job, so sometimes girls couldn't go to school in the past, but thanks to the Play Pump, now getting water is quick and easy- and even boys want to do the job. The pumps are a centre of social activity where kids and adults come together while they are collecting water.
- 5 There are educational messages on the two sides of the tanks. The messages tell people about good health practices like hand-washing. On the other two sides, there are advertisements.
- At the moment, more than 800 Play Pumps are operating in schools and communities in four African countries. These provide water for almost two million people. The pumps are made by a South African company called Outdoor Fabrication and Steelworks. Another company, Roundabout Outdoor, trains local teams who maintain the pumps. Twelve-year-old Siyabulisiw Khumalo lives in a South African community called Diepsloot. She says, 'I saw many kinds of water pumps in the farming region, where I grew up, but this one is very different. It stores the water. When I grow up, I want to be an inventor because I want to invent clever things like the Play Pump that will help my community.'

### THE GREAT BARRIER REEF

- The Great Barrier Reef, off the east coast of Australia, is one of the wonders of the natural world. The area abounds with wildlife, including green turtles, varieties of dolphins and whales, more than 1500 species of fish, and more than 200 species of birdlife. The Great Barrier Reef system consists of many different types of coral reefs, some of which are slow-growing and live to be hundreds of years old. The ideal environment for coral reef is shallow warm water where there is a lot of water movement, plenty of light and where the water is salty and low in nutrients. As coral reefs are sensitive to changes in patterns of water movement and to physical damage, this natural world wonder is under threat.
- 2 Firstly, tourism has a negative impact on the Great Barrier Reef. Reef walking, dropped anchors, boats dropping fuel and other sorts of pollution all destroy the coral reef. Even the number of people in the water with their sweat and suntan lotions has a negative impact on the fragile coral reef environment. That's why most of the coral reefs in the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park and various parts of it are protected in certain ways. For example, fishing is restricted in some areas and particular animals like whales, dolphins and green turtles are protected. Visitors also value the reef's beauty and diversity and there is support from tourism operators and tourists as well as government agencies.
- 3 Secondly, the bleaching(whitening) of corals has a negative effect on the Great Barrier Reef. <u>It</u> causes corals to go into stress and eventually die. This phenomenon is not exclusive to the Great Barrier Reef, but has been observed on reefs throughout the world. It is thought the bleaching has been caused by rises in water temperature related to the El Nino effect.
- 4 Finally, there is the Crown of Thorns starfish, a type of animal, which cares little for the exceptional beauty and the vast diversity of the Great Barrier reef. This type of starfish feeds mainly on corals and as a result, destroys them. Since the 1960s, the Crown of Thorns has been destroying the corals

which make up the Reef. The Australian government carries out a range of research programs on their negative impact on the corals and on the possible biological and other control mechanisms for them.

5 Even with these problems and challenges, the Great Barrier Reef is an environment of extraordinary beauty and richness, with a diversity of plant, animal and sea life. That's why we must conserve it, and maintain it as a great place to relax. Moreover, we must do everything we can to enjoy this part of Australia's natural heritage.

#### GETTING THE BEST OUT OF OUR CHILDERN

- 1. There is a strange paradox to the success of the Asian education model. When compared to western standards, class sizes are huge in countries such as Japan and Korea, with an average of 30 to 40 students per class. However, school children in developed Asian economies rank among the highest in the world for academic achievement in the areas of science and mathematics, especially on standardized tests. Meanwhile, in British secondary schools, students fail to become successful despite having possibly the most ideal conditions that would help them succeed.
- 2. Why do Asian students seem to perform so well then? Is it their legendary discipline? Certainly, classroom management seems to be a whole lot easier in places like Korea, and perhaps lessons are more effective as a direct consequence. After all, we are only too aware of the decline in discipline standards in our own schools; **belligerent** and disrespectful students appear to be the norm these days. Teachers in Britain seem powerless to control what happens in their classroms. Surely this situation does not create a very effective learning environment. Therefore, perhaps the number of students in a classroom is not relevant in the reasons why they are less successful, and actually it is the students' manners that are more important.
- 3. Still, there are other factors to consider, too. Korean students spend a lot more time with their teachers; therefore, it seems logical to suggest that they might form stronger bonds and greater trust. In addition, Korean teachers, in understanding their pupils better, might be able to offer them a more effective learning program. Of course, this common trust and understanding leads to greater respect as well, so Korean students are probably less likely to ignore their teachers' advice.
- 4. Then, there is the home environment. The traditional family unit still remains relatively unharmed in Korea. Few children come from broken homes with separated or divorced parents, so there is a sense of security, safety and trust both at home and at school. In Britain, on the other hand, one in every two marriages fails and divorce rates are extremely high. Perhaps children struggle to cope with unstable family conditions, and their only way to express their frustration is by misbehaving at school.
- 5. However, while the Japanese, Korean and Asian models generally do seem to produce excellent results, the statistics don't tell the whole truth. Behind those great maths and science scores, there is a quite remarkable work ethic. Asian students tend to put their education before everything else. They do very few extracurricular, or additional activities and they devote far more time to their studies than their British peers. Yet, is all that extra effort justified for a few extra percentage points in some meaningless international student performance survey? The fact that Asian students are on average 3-5% better at maths than the British is really not that important. What is more important is their quality of life. School days are supposed to be the best, are **they** not?
- 6. There has been a lot of attention and praise given to these Asian models and their 'impressive' statistics. Without question, some of this praise is justified and fair, but it seems that there are two extremes here. At one hand, there is the discipline and unbelievably hard work ethic of the Asian students. On the other hand, there are the British students who sometimes appear careless and extremely undisciplined by comparison. However, at least they do have free time to enjoy their youth and explore their interests. Is it really possible to say which system is clearly the better one? Perhaps,

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it is time to stop comparing one to the other. Maybe it is time to start trying to combine the best bits of both in order to finally offer our students a balanced, worthwhile education.
